Silver Hills Historical Society was host to an open house and reception at the Home of The Silver Hills Historical Collection, Saturday, June 15. The community of Silver Hills walked the halls of history, which are filled with displays and artifacts documenting neighborhood's historical heritage. The iconic landscape view of New Albany painted on Silver Hills by George W. Morrison in 1849 greets visitors as they enter the home. The painting is flanked on both sides by two charming portraits by Morrison. The images are digital copies of the originals but one would be hard pressed to see a difference. On the east wall, sitting above a 100-year-old heirloom Steinway piano, is an original Morrison portrait. believed to be of Col. William W. Tuley painted by Morrison in 1886. Samuel J. and Britty Pauline Elsby purchased the Steinway grand

piano when they moved to Silver Mary Means of Hills in 1918. Louisville, KY, was the first to play the piano since it was fully restored. Mary granddaughter of Henry Terstegge, who was a resident of Silver Hills from 1891 until his death in 1912. Mary is an accomplished pianist. When she began to play, the music was simply remarkable.


Three bedrooms are filled with history about the Hill. The first room houses photographs and articles about those on the Hill who became aviators dating as far back as 1919. The room also documents the sport of tennis beginning when the Highland County Club was built in 1906. Eleven tennis courts have been documented on the Hill. In 1906, Silver Hills brought the game of tennis to the city of New Albany.


Another room is dedicated to Alice Greene, the founder of the Alpha Club in 1895. There are several artifacts on display that have never been seen outside of the Alpha Club. One in particular, is the Alpha Club quilt. The quilt is a colorful tribute to the woman's literary society still in The story about existence today. Alice Greene's family, and her father's Greeneland Fruit Farm ca. 1860, is also on display. There is a charming portrait of Alice's little brother, John Owen Greene. The picture was painted by George Morrison in 1869, the same year little John died.

The front room is the display room. It features the Silver Hills Highland Railway trolley car exhibit. There is a large TV where one can watch a slide show about the trolley car line (1891 - 1932). On a large open wall in the room is a display of the New Albany Water Works, featuring the original Water Works ledger book where the volume of water pumped was

recorded beginning in 1876. The book is in pristine condition, on loan from the Indiana American Water Company. The Water Works display will remain through the end of the year, at which time a new display will be installed. There is a glass museum case in the center of the room, where many interesting artifacts are on display.

Harry Elsby and Mary Ann Carnighan built the house in 1959. It is where they raised their family of three children: Ann Carol, Harry Michael and Kelly. The home remains in the Carnighan family today.

The Home of The Silver Hills Collection will open to the public every Saturday from 1:00 - 4:00 PM beginning October 5, 2019.

Mary Terstegge Means kindly donated the champagne glass for display from a set of 12 that once was owned by Henry and Mary Terstegge of Silver Hills. They had the letter "T" applied to the glass for Terstegge, and the letters "K C" applied for Knob Crest, the name of their estate. It is presumed the glasses date back to the 1890s. Henry and his wife purchased the house in 1891. The house was destroyed by fire in 1926.

Tribute To Sara Smith & Julie Gohmann



Sara Winges Smith (Aug 18, 1940 – Jan 11, 2019) Of all the house fires on Silver Hills causing substantial damage or complete loss of the house, not a single fire, historically, resulted in a loss of life. On Friday morning, January 11, 2019 an historic home on Ridgeway erupted into a towering inferno claiming the life of Sara Smith. Sara was 79. She and her husband, Dr. Richard Smith, bought the home in 1973. It was affectionately called the Shingles for its shake siding. Richard was a member of the faculty at the University of Louisville School of Medicine in the Department of Psychology and Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology The house was originally built around 1903 by Harold Eddy and Corene Barrett. The Barrett

family made it their family home for more than 40 years. In the mid-1930s, a fire badly damaged the upstairs part of the house. It was rebuilt to look as it did when Sara and Richard bought the house.

Sara lived alone in the home after her husband passed away in 2017. Sara was an active member of the Silver Hills Alpha Club and the Silver Hills Historical Society. She is survived by a daughter, Eileen Kerry Smith Britton and Eileen's husband, Jerry, of Silver Hills.

Sara will always be remembered for her generous gift of kindness toward all those who had the pleasure of her company.





Julie Ann Gohmann (June 9, 1958 – January 3, 2019) Julie was the youngest of four children of Mary and Mark Gohmann, Silver Hills. Her father was the youngest of seven children of Charles and Sarah Gohmann of Silver Hills. In 1913, Charles moved his family to the large two-story house located at the corner of Knob Ave and Maple Lane. He was president of the Gohmann Brothers and Kahler Company of New Albany, manufactures of stoves. Like her father, Julie lived her entire life on Silver Hills. She was nine years old when her father died tragically of cancer at an early age. It was a terrible loss for the family, especially for Julie. But Julie's personality never reflected her sadness. Those who knew her found her to be an engaging individual, happy, outgoing, enthusiastic, and filled with love for her family and friends. Julie was an active member of the Silver Hills Alpha Club and a member of the Silver Hills Historical Society. She is survived by two daughters: Emily & Elyse LaGarene; husband, Stan Farrell; and two brothers, Charles and John. Julie will be missed by all those who knew her.
